Native trees now available. The U.S. Agriculture Department's Soil Conservation Service has trees available for commercial uses such as reforestation, windbreaks, wildlife inducements, erosion control and Christmas trees. Native plum, green asn, Russian olive, Douglas fir and other species are available from the Service for \$13 per nundred, with a maximum order of 5,000 trees. The bare-rooted trees are sold only to persons with at least two acres of land who will not use them for landscaping or ornamental purposes. However, the SCS does offer free advise to nomeowners on landscaping with native trees and shrubs. from The New Mexican, 11/30/78.






Fig. 28. Pinus edulis, Pinyon Pine
