5. Briefly, how was the grant money from the Carter Conservation Fund used? The Carter Conservation Fund was used to eradicate invasive tamarisk along approximately five miles of the Gila River in the Gila River Bird Area of the Gila National Forest.

On November 29, 2022, I wrote and submitted a final report stating that the work was not yet completed because we encountered two unexpected delays. The first delay, a new Forest Service requirement to complete a Notice of Intent to use herbicides, was reported in our November final report. The second delay was caused by weather. After submitting the November report stating that the work would be completed by mid-December, southwest New Mexico received enough precipitation to raise the level of the Gila River. Because most of the tamarisk work requires crossing the river on foot, we were forced to wait until May 2023 for the river to recede sufficiently (and for the water to warm up!) that the work could safely be accomplished. Treatment consists of cutting all tamarisk stems and treating the stumps with herbicide Garlon 3A. Our contractor records GPS locations of treated trees, number of trees and stems, size classes of stems, and other pertinent notes. In addition, he takes before-andafter photos of some stands. Our contractor completed all the tamarisk removal work in the Gila River Bird Area, on both sides of the river, floodplains, and one canyon with tamarisks. I do not yet have the contractor's data on number of trees cut and treated with herbicide, but I should receive that by the end of July. That information will be reported in the article I will write for the NPSNM newsletter.

Our project aligns with the Native Plant Society's mission to conserve and restore native plants and their habitats.

As stated in our November 2022 final report, we now know the importance of communicating early with the Forest Service to make sure there are no new requirements that could cause delays. More importantly, after working on tamarisk eradication since 2016, it has been our experience that an effective way to kill tamarisk is to treat them for two consecutive years and then wait one or two years before revisiting the area to re-treat any resprouts or new seedlings.
